Bios

Karen Towsley (Director) A Drama Teacher and Director at Westwood Community High School since 1986, Karen completed her Masters of Fine Arts in Directing at the University of Alberta in May 2000. Prior to founding the Wayawitmayihk Theatre Company she spent many years performing and directing at Keyano Theatre and was a member of the British Sm'isles comedy troupe. Besides her many directing projects Karen derives much pleasure from coaching the nationally renowned Westwood Improv Team and is founder of the Alberta Regional Tournament of the Canadian Improv Games. Karen served many years on the Board of Directors of Theatre Alberta, including two years as President. Although she is a workaholic, also serving on the Board of Governors of Keyano College, she does hope to find time to act again sometime in the next twenty years.

Mike Eddy (Music Director) Mike is a graduate of the University of Western Ontario with a degree in Theory and Composition. Mike has taught music at Westwood Community High School since 1986. He has been accompanist for over 20 Keyano productions as well as music director for British Sm'Isles, Keyano Theatre, Wayawitmayihk Theatre Company and Cheepiyak Theatre (Westwood)

Alan Roberts (Lighting Designer) Alexander marks Alan's 6th lighting design for Wayawitmayihk Theatre and he has loved working on every one. The other five lighting credits include For the Pleasure of Seeing Her Again, A Moving Song, The Attic, The Pearls, and Three Fine Girls, How to Eat Like A Child and Good Night Desdemona (Good Morning Juliet). He has also designed for Keyano Theatre's productions of Amadeus, A Street Car Named Desire, Remoka Rink, A Wonderful Life and Les Liaisons Dangereuses (twice!) - just to name a few. Alan has created the lighting for Westwood Community High School's production of Into the Woods and Murder in the Cathedral. Last summer he did the lighting design for PH Productions one woman show -Tell Me on a Sunday, by Andrew Lloyd Weber. Some of his other freelance credits include Billy Bishop Goes to War, and Your Wildest Dreams, for Great West Theatre Company plus The Other Side of the Pole for Primestock Theatre. Alan occasionally moves outside of the world of lighting to see what damage he can do with Set Design and surprisingly has not been lynched by Bill with his set designs for The Attic, The Pearls, and Three Fine Girls, Good Night Desdemona (Good Morning Juliet), and Murder in the Cathedral although it came close for Les Misérables.

Darlene Mitchell (Stage Manager) The only production Darlene missed with Wayawitmayihk Theatre was when she and her husband traveled to Australia last year. Each time Alexander makes reference in this play to going to Australia, Darlene just wants to shout "OK, Let's Go". Several members of the cast are actors that Darlene has met for the first time and it truly has been a pleasure to work with all of them. Darlene would like to thank the Director, Music Director, Lighting Director and Technical Director for again letting her be part of the immersion while having a lot fun in the process.

Bill Towsley (TD) The co-founder of Wayawitmayihk Theatre Company, Bill discovered his love of the technical aspects of theatre while attending Thornhill Secondary School. He has remained involved ever since, including the last 17 years as Technical Director of Westwood's Cheepiyak Theatre. In addition, Bill has spent countless hours volunteering and mentoring backstage for Keyano Theatre. Bill was the resident stage manager and technical director for British Sm'Isles and has often been blamed for the blackout that prevented audiences from seeing the "full" monty. Bill has appeared on stage only once, as Roy in the Keyano Theatre production of The Odd Couple.

Alexander takes you back to the days of the Incredible Hulk (the original series), the Brady Bunch, Bazooka and Bubble Yum gum, Izod "pouch" wind-breakers, Jordache jeans, Donnie and Marie or Sonny and Cher posters, and having Jaws to thank for your hydrophobia. Just let yourself be a kid again and have as much fun watching it as André does performing it!
