Her hands are incredibly soft.

What lessons about life did I receive from my mother? What have my own two daughters learned from me? I know with certainty that my creativity was nurtured and celebrated as soon as it began to emerge. I am who I am because I was allowed...no encouraged... to be exactly who I am by both of my parents. I hope my two beautiful daughters feel that encouragement from me!

What a woman Michel Tremblay's mother was! What a woman my mother is! It is my hope that as you leave the theatre tonight you will be thinking, with love, about your own mothers and what incredible, complex, ridiculous beings mothers are!

I dedicate For the Pleasure of Seeing Her Again to my mother, Carol Godfrey Stinson Henderson, who is alive and well and gives me the pleasure of her company often.

Besides her many directing projects Karen derives much pleasure from coaching the nationally renowned Westwood Improv Team and is founder of the Alberta Regional Tournament of the Canadian Improv Games. Karen served many years on the Board of Directors of Theatre Alberta, including two years as President. Although she is a workaholic, also serving on the Board of Governors of Keyano College, she does hope to find time to act again sometime in the next twenty years.

Bios

Darlene Mitchell (SM) This is the 4th Wayawitmayihk production that Darlene has had the pleasure of stage managing. This being a character play, at times the stories came fast and furious for all of us. Listen to the words in the stories -- there is something for all of us to learn.

Bill Towsley (TD) The co-founder of Wayawitmayihk Theatre Company, Bill discovered his love of the technical aspects of theatre while attending Thornhill Secondary School. He has remained involved ever since, including the last 16 years as Technical Director of Westwood's Cheepiyak Theatre. In addition, Bill has spent countless hours volunteering and mentoring backstage for Keyano Theatre. Bill was the resident stage manager and technical director for British Sm'Isles and has often been blamed for the blackout that prevented audiences from seeing the "full" monty. Bill has appeared on stage only once, as Roy in the Keyano Theatre production of The Odd Couple.

Alan Roberts (Lighting Designer) For the Pleasure of Seeing Her Again marks Alan's 5th lighting design for Wayawitmayihk Theatre and he has loved working on every one. The other four lighting credits include The Attic, The Pearls, and Three Fine Girls, How to Eat Like A Child and Good Night Desdemona (Good Morning Juliet) and A Moving Song. He has also designed for Keyano Theatre's productions of Amadeus, A Street Car Named Desire, Remoka Rink, A Wonderful Life and Les Liaisons Dangereuses (twice!) - just to name a few. Alan has created the lighting for Westwood Community High School's Cheepiyak Theatre including Into the Woods, Murder in the Cathedral and most recently, Les Miserables. Some of his other freelance credits include PH Productions one woman show -Tell Me on a Sunday, by Andrew Lloyd Weber, Billy Bishop Goes to War, and Your Wildest Dreams, for Great West Theatre Company plus The Other Side of the Pole for Primestock Theatre. Alan occasionally moves outside of the world of lighting to see what damage he can do with set design. Surprisingly, he has not been lynched by Bill with his set designs for The Attic, The Pearls, and Three Fine Girls, Good Night Desdemona (Good Morning Juliet), and especially Les Miserables.

Timberley Shorr (Costume Designer) This is Timmi's 3rd production with the Wayawitmayihk Theatre Company. She truly enjoys every experience with Karen and the group she always assembles. This play allows her to recall fond memories of her Baba. She hopes you can find your "pleasure" in this evening's performance.

Maralyn Ryan (Nana) Ms Ryan is delighted to perform in a community that has become her "Northern Spirit", for here, she has found the eloquence and generosity of many talented people. When not working "on the road" she cohabits with partner, photographer, Ted Shehinski. In Fort McMurray, she has directed Harold and Maude, A Midsummer Night's Dream and Grapes of Wrath for Keyano Theatre. She has also been active in schools, doing workshops in acting and puppetry. For the past two summers, she has been Artistic Director of a Performing Arts Camp for young people in Fort McMurray, directing her adaptation of Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone and Tom Sawyer on the Athabasca, an environmental production performed in Heritage Park. Plays for this summer 2003 are in the works.

Ms Ryan founded the St. Albert Children's Theatre and directed there for ten years. For the Citadel Theatre, she directed the International Children's Festival and The Teen Festival of the Arts as well as the Citadel Theatre School, before giving more time to acting.

Selected acting credits include Hamlet, Romeo and Juliet, The Aberhart Summer, Tete a Tete, Lend me a Tenor and A Christmas Carol for the Citadel Theatre; Vivian Bearing in Wit for the Globe Theatre; A Guide to Mourning for Alberta Theatre Projects; Cat on a Hot Tin Roof for Theatre Calgary; Homeward Bound for the Grand National/National Arts Centre; Master Class for Sudbury Theatre; Joy and Shop at Sly Corner for the Shaw Festival; Crackpot for Prairie Theatre Exchange/ Belfry Theatre and Thirteen Hands for the Canadian Stage/National Arts Centre. Ms Ryan has created roles that earned three Sterling Awards for Outstanding Performance and nine nominations.

Ms Ryan would like to affectionately thank John, Darlene, Karen and the committed and talented people who have made this production possible. Thank you to all the cherished friendships I have here, to my daughters in Edmonton, and to Ted for the best chili on the planet!

John Gaunce (Narrator) John is thrilled to be a part of this production.
